About the Awardee

Dr. Haseltine has been at the forefront of health technology since the early 1980s. She is an innovator and inventor holding numerous patents. Her current activities include developing mobile apps for the

field of reproductive sciences and her latest app, Embryo, has been selected for highlighting on gsa.gov and has received a group award from the National Library of Medicine.

At heart she is a pioneer who has accepted few limits. As Director of the Center for Population Research of the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, at the National Institutes of Health, she led the way for advances in contraception research and other critical health areas. She is a fighter and has tirelessly promoted the advancement of women and was the founding editor of the Journal for Women's Health. In 1990 she founded the Society for the Advancement of Women's Health Research (SWHR). Retiring in 2013, she was named Emerita Scientist.

In 1964 she received a B.A. in Biophysics from the University of California-Berkeley. Receiving her Ph.D. in Biophysics in 1970 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, she went on to graduate with an M.D. in 1972 from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine.
